

PARISH NOTES

THIS SUNDAY The scene of the temptation, which opens the public life of Jesus, declares in the Gospels in a very forceful manner the great change in our lives that He introduces into the world by His work of redemption. Where Adam fell, Christ, the new Head of humanity, triumphs over the power of Satan: at the time of His passion "the prince of this world" will be cast out. The Gospel of the temptation heralds Christ's victory. The very thought of our divine Lord's suffering hunger, loneliness, and humiliation at the hands of his enemy—and that all this was for us—should make us feel ashamed at the little bits of suffering and humiliation we are willing to suffer for our own selves. He had no sin to atone for. He was making atonement for us and for our sins.

THE GOSPEL Each year the gospel reading for the first Sunday of Lent is about Jesus' testing in the desert. Mark's emphasis is distinctly different from that of Matthew and Luke. No details of the testing, but rather Jesus' sojourn in the desert is rather almost a return to the peace of the Garden of Eden. The desert of Judaea, between Jerusalem and the Jordan Valley, is a noble and dignified solitude of smooth, sandstone hills. Nothing grows, of course, but wild camels and the occasional leopard prowl around. There Jesus was 'with the wild animals' as, led by the Spirit, he made his preparation for his mission. In what way was he tested? We may presume that in solitude and prayer he was working out the implications of the Voice from Heaven at his Baptism. How was he to run his course as the beloved Servant of the Lord? Precisely how was he to bring the presence Kingship of God into people's lives? The 'forty' is often used in biblical accounts for a period of preparation, as Israel's forty years in the desert, or the apostles' forty days of preparation between Easter and Ascension. We may use our forty days to reflect how we may bring God's presence to bear in and through our lives.

SAINTS ALIVE St Peter Damian (1007 - 1072) was born in Ravenna and studied theology and canon law, becoming a renowned teacher in both Parma and Ravenna. In his late twenties he abandoned all this and joined the hermitage of Fonte Avellana, near Gubbio, where he became prior in 1043: a position he held until his death. He strongly promoted the religious life in many parts of Italy. The Church at that time was in a terrible state and he supported the Popes in their efforts at reform, both by his writings and as a papal envoy. Pope Stephen IX named him a cardinal and Bishop of Ostia. He died on 21 February 1072 and was immediately acclaimed as a saint. **St Polycarp (- 155)** was a disciple of the Apostles, bishop of Smyrna, and a friend of St Ignatius of Antioch. He went to Rome to confer with Pope Anicetus about the celebration of Easter. He was martyred at Smyrna in about 155 by being burnt to death in the stadium. Polycarp is an important figure in the history of the Church because he is one of the earliest Christians whose writings still survive. He bears witness to the beliefs

of the early Christians and the early stages of the development of doctrine. **TIME TO PRAY** Next Tues, 20th Feb, the church will be open for a time of time of public & private prayer. This will be guided by a friendly parishioner and will be for no more than an hour from 2:45 in the afternoon. All are welcome.

MISSIONARY SISTERS VISIT next Sunday at both churches some missionary sisters are planning to come and appeal for their communities. I'm sure you will respond with customary generosity. **ABORTION LIMITATION PETITION** you can find cards at the back of the church that have been sent for you to message your MP to seek support for the amendment to the Criminal Justice Bill lowering division time limit to 22 weeks. I hope you will have chance to find these cards, filling the details and posting them to your MP.

INTER-PARISH GATHERING It was good during the week to welcome members of the Glossop churches to a meeting with some St Charles parish leaders. Together they surveyed the journey towards parish coalescence, cooperation and communication in the future.

On Tuesday 5 March from 6.30 to 8pm in the oratory, all parishioners are welcome to come along and hear more about these initial discussions.

RETREATS we have had information from the diocese about three retreats offered within the diocese during Lent. **The Young Persons' retreat** is planned for Holy Cross Priory Leicester, 10-4pm on 2nd March. You people aged between 18 and 35 will be welcome. **The Women's Retreat** is taking place in Newark Holy Trinity hall on Sat 9th March, 10am-3pm : £12. **The Mens' Retreat** is dated Sat 23rd March at Mt St Bernard's Abbey, 10-4pm.

ALMSGIVING Immaculate Conception parishioners are invited during Lent, to support the needy by bringing goods to a container at the back of church. Such goods might include tinned and dried food products, basic toiletries, sanitary goods, cleaning materials etc. These goods will be made available to G52, which supports the Gamesley food bank project
