### **PARISH NOTES**

THIS SUNDAY we honour the two greatest apostles, Sts Peter and Paul. The accent of the readings fall principally on St Peter. The choosing of Peter teaches us a lesson. The Church's foundation-stone and its first leader is not all-wise, all-knowing, good, heroic, and beautiful. He is a very ordinary man who makes about as many mistakes as we would in his place and kicks himself for them just as thoroughly afterwards. If St Peter had been a hero, we could easily have despaired of ever becoming like him. If St Peter had been great, and noble, and good, we could have told ourselves that the Church is for the saints, despaired, sat down, and not bothered. But the Church is not just for saints: it is for confused, impetuous, cowardly people like us — or St Peter. The rock crumbles, the ropes are frayed, the wood is rotten — but, although that improbable building, the Church, is made of such inferior materials, it grows (on the whole) faster than it collapses, and it is grace that holds it together. In the end, it was grace that gave the coward the courage to bear witness when it counted, grace that gave the fool the wisdom he needed to set the infant Church on her way, grace that taught the impetuous man patience and forbearance. We none of us admire ourselves, however much we would like to; let us not try to admire St Peter either, but admire instead the grace he was given, and pray that, weak as we are, we may be given it too and may use it.

**THE GOSPEL** This gospel reading is a turning-point in the Gospel. Three times the disciples have been chided for their failure to understand who Jesus is, and now, with an almost perceptible flash of inspiration, Peter replies to the question with a full confession, not merely as in Mark that Jesus is the Messiah, but that he is son of the living God. Jesus replies by giving him a new name and explaining its meaning. The Aramaic name, Kephas, which Paul still uses (in Galatians 1-2), means 'Rock', which enables Jesus to play on the word for the foundation-stone of 'his assembly'. Is Jesus putting 'his assembly', his ekklesia, in parallel with the assembly of God which was Israel as the People of God in the Old Testament, and saying that his assembly is the new People of God?

To Peter Jesus also gives the power to bind and loose, by the conjunction of opposites implying to the Semitic mind that he is giving all power. So much is widely recognised in all catholic teaching. But it is important to recognise that the same promise is made to the community itself in Matthew 18.18, the community discourse, giving it the same authority to bind and loose. To Peter, then, is given the power in the person of the Church.

SAINTS ALIVE The First Martyrs of the See of Rome When the city of Rome had been devastated by fire in the year 64, the Emperor Nero launched a persecution against the Christians, who were thrown to the wild beasts in the arena or soaked in tar and used as living torches. Their deaths are documented in the writings of the Roman historian Tacitus and in Pope St Clement's letter to the Corinthians. St Oliver Plunkett (1625 - 1681) was archbishop of Armagh and primate of All Ireland from 1668, at a time when the country was in a state of civil and religious disorder after the interventions of Oliver Cromwell. He persevered for ten years in his effort to ameliorate this state of affairs, until the discovery of a non-existent "Popish Plot" against the English government (invented and revealed by Titus Oates, who implicated many before he was executed for his part in it) gave the authorities an excuse to act against many prominent Catholics. Plunkett was arrested in Ireland but taken to London for trial; one of his companions was saved by being appointed as Bavarian Ambassador to London and therefore acquiring diplomatic immunity, but for Plunkett there was no such escape, and he was hanged at Tyburn, cheating his executioners by dying before he could be ceremonially disembowelled. St Thomas the Apostle is famous for doubting the resurrection of Jesus when his fellow apostles told him about it; but if he is the sceptical apostle, he is also the believing apostle, for having seen and touched a risen man, he made the immediate leap of faith and so became the first apostle to call Jesus God Nothing is known about Thomas's later career. A well-known apocryphal document called the Acts of Thomas relates his missionary journeys to Persia and India. Such a journey would have been easy enough – important trade routes lay that way – and if some of the apostles went west, to Rome, the centre of the world, there is no reason why some others should not have chosen to go east, to the edge of the known world.
